SIP-HKIS PDD-URA Forum in Singapore: What's Next? New Plans in Singapore & Hong Kong

The planning forum the PDD jointly organized with the Singapore Institute of Planners (SIP) and Urban Redevelopment Authority (URA) was successfully held in Singapore on World Planning Day, 8 November. Before the forum started, the HKIS delegates, including corporate members from Hong Kong, Singapore and Beijing Chapters as well as other members from HKIP and GCPA visited Singapore's Housing and Development Board (HDB) to better understand the latest planning and development strategies of Public Housing in Singapore.

Since the establishment of Singapore, HDB has been playing a key role in supporting Singapore's commitment to sustainable development. Instead of addressing housing issues, HDB takes a comprehensive approach in planning and developing well-designed towns guided by various principles such as planning for self-sufficiency, the Neighborhood concept, the Checkerboard concept, hierarchy of facilities and planning for connectivity. Working with industry partners and other government bodies, HDB is also actively exploring technologies and urban solutions that could make towns even more livable, efficient and safe.

One of the successful cases adopting the above-mentioned smart city concepts was the Jurong Innovation District, an advanced manufacturing campus planned and developed by JTC Corporation. When completed, the district will create an environment to house different activities which bring together researchers, students, innovators and businesses to develop products and services of the future.

to Lantau Tomorrow Vision; the new NDA's planning, transport, and infrastructure limitations in the New Territories; the proposed new CBDs; the debates over land supply for housing development; and the Letter M. It helped shed light on how future developments in the New Territories can be fully optimised to meet Hong Kong's most pressing social needs.

Mr Ivan Chung, Deputy Director of the Planning Department, presented facts about the significant economic contributions of the NDAs and New Town Extensions, acknowledging the strategic importance of forming smart, green and resilient (SGR) communities in the NT for Hong Kong's sustainable development. In light of the current commuting issue faced by NT residents, Professor Ling Kar-kan recommended the establishment of the CBD 3.0: East Lantau Metropolis, northern economic belt and new NDAs in order to achieve a more sustainable spatial job-house balance by enhancing the economic position of the NT.

Sr Prof Chau Kwong Wing stated that since 2012, car registration has exceeded the population growth. According to the figures, car ownership rate of NT households is higher than that of the urban areas in Hong Kong and the price of private car parks is increasing dramatically in recent years. As such, there is a need to address the growing demand for car parking spaces in the NDAs of the NT.

PDD Annual Conference

On 16 November, the PDD successfully held a half-day annual conference on the topic, "Planning and Development in the New Territories". Attendees appreciated the valuable insights of the guest speakers, seasoned professionals from the private and public sectors, and academic and community leaders (Mr Ivan Chung, Sr Prof Chau Kwong Wing, Professor Ling Kar-kan, Mr Ryan Ip, Sr Hon Tony Tse, and Sr Prof Albert So Chun-hin).

plans to introduce it to all stakeholders to avoid public misinterpretations, which may hinder the execution of the new scheme at a later stage.



Dialogue with Secretary for Development - Forum on Land Sharing Scheme

On 18 November, I was invited to meet with the Secretary for Development, Mr Michael Wong Wai-lun, and his team to discuss the Legislative Council's Land Sharing Pilot Scheme. Under the current proposal, only land that is covered by NDAs, New Town Extension projects, and other areas under study (public housing, country parks, and special areas), as well as those zoned under the six environmentally sensitive uses and 12 priority sites for enhanced conservation under the New Nature Conservation Policy, is ineligible for the pilot scheme. In other words, areas zoned as green belts and V-zones may also be eligible for the application. Even so, the attractiveness of the scheme to developers is questionable, as it requires at least 70% of the additional GFA to be carved out and surrendered to the Government to provide public housing or starter homes, while the full premium for the part that comprises private housing and commercial facilities must be paid.

To boost the application rate, the PDD recommends that flexibility should be allowed for the additional GFA division ratio between the developer and Government, while a discount should be considered for the land premium. Without incentives for private landowners, the scheme may not achieve its intended goals.

Through more constructive dialogue, I hope the Government will formulate comprehensive
